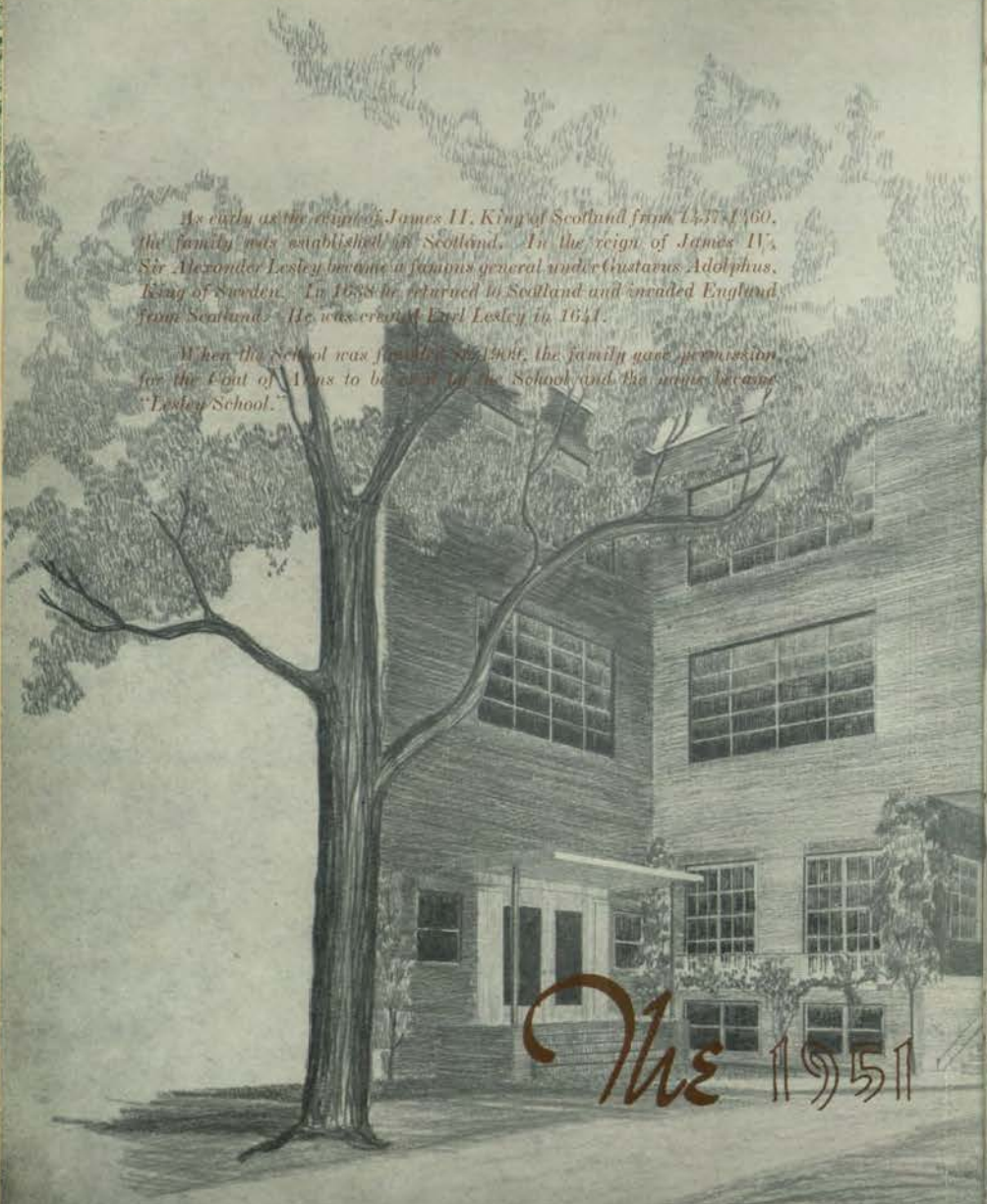

As early as the reign of James II, King of Scotland from 1437-1460, the family was established in Scotland. In the reign of James IV, Sir Alexander Lesley became a famous general under Gustavus Adolphus, King of Sweden. In 1638 he returned to Scotland and headed England from Scotland. He was created Earl Lesley in 1644.

When the school was founded in 1809, the family gave permission for the Coat of Arms to be used in the School and the name became "Lesley School."
