

Over the past year, Linda Brion-Meisles has been working with SANE, a national citizen's group which works for the reversal of the arms race, and conversion to a peace-time economy. One of the goals of this organization is to establish a Rapid Response Network to improve our ability to affect public policy.

This network consists of a phone tree in each congressional district maintained by volunteers. When important legislation comes up in congress, a phone call by the National SANE office to each district would activate the whole network and hence, would greatly improve our lobbying

### Ski Club



The Lesley College Hearing-Impaired Awareness Club has been springing back to life this semester after one year of inactivity. This year's officers are:


