Kindergarten Conference

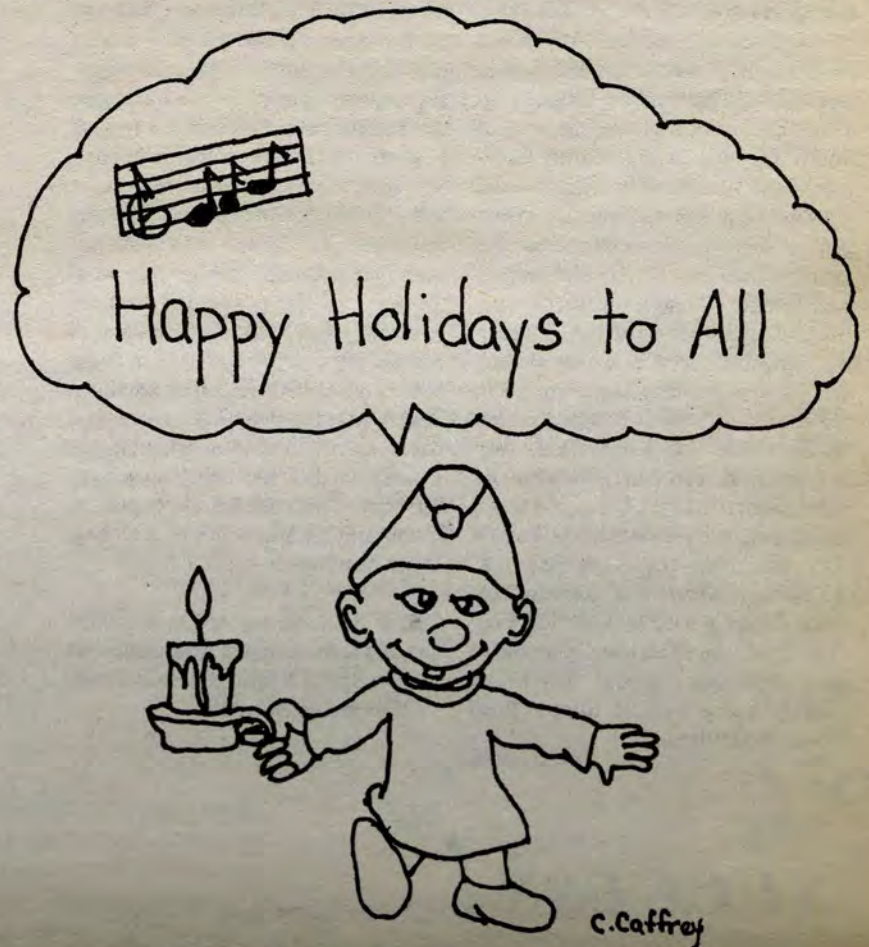

Keith likes Cambridge, he especially likes all the places there are to visit and the many things there are to do. He is glad that many places are within walking distance. He said that Cambridge, Massachusetts is unlike Cambridge,

England in that Cambridge, England is more a suburban town. Overall, Keith feels that Cambridge, Mass. is a very nice place.

In comparing T.V. programs in general Keith prefers English television. Although he has not viewed a great deal of television here, Keith seems to enjoy Sesame Street which is aired in England, and Channel Two News. He especially likes our "lively weathermen". He also likes the variety of movies that we have here.

Keith said he found the atmosphere here to be very warm and friendly. He feels very welcome. Generally, Keith's impressions of Lesley College and Boston are very good and he seems to be happy. We hope the rest of of his visit in America is even better. Good Luck!

The Nuclear Awareness Committee (Lesley UCAM) is co-sponsoring a coffee house with the Women's Center. The coffee house will feature John Vorhaus, musician and singer. Over the past year, Linda Brion-Meisles has been working with SANE, a national citizen's group which works for the reversal of the arms race, and conversion to a peace-time economy. One of the goals of this organization is to establish a Rapid Response Network to improve our ability to affect public policy.

This network consists of a phone tree in each congressional district maintained by volunteers. When important legislation comes up in congress, a phone call by the National SANE office to each district would activate the whole network and hence, would greatly improve our lobbying efforts.

Isaacson describes what was included in the proposed letter which was released to all Catholic Bishops in the U.S. and discusses some controversies that have arisen from this proposed letter.

Another article of interest can be found in the November 22nd issue of *Time Magazine*. This article, "One Quota that was Overfilled," by Strobe Talbott, discusses the history of Brezhnev's and the United States' arms build up. Read up on these issues and become more aware of what is going on with the nuclear arms build up. This issue affects all of us.

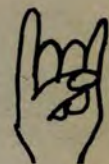

The Lesley College Hearing-Impaired Awareness Club has been springing back to life this semester after one year of inactivity. This year's officers are:

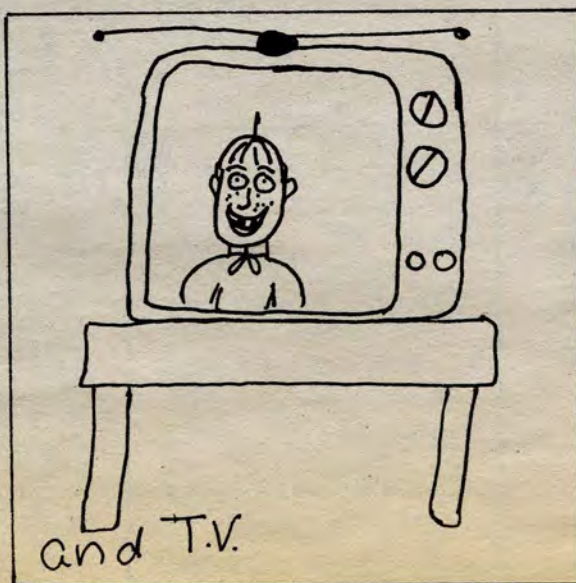
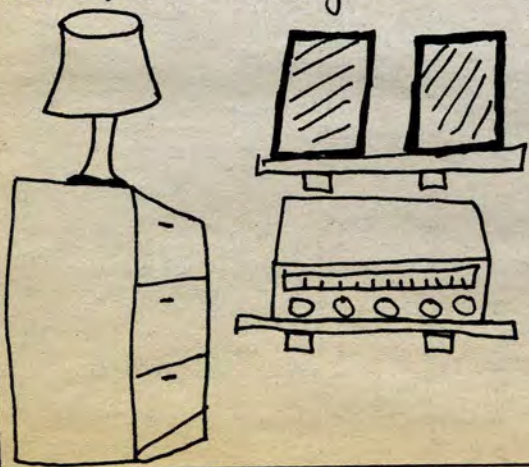
